DEVOTIONS



Read: Matthew 2:13-23.

Christmas time is a wonderful opportunity to sing Christmas hymns, see beautiful lights and contemplate peace on earth. However, Matthew 2 brings us back to the daily fears and violence that continues around us. Innocent children are slaughtered because a king fears for his power. The slaughter of innocent children continues to this day. The holy family flees to a land that once enslaved God's people, yet there the family is protected. People seek protection today as refugees in historic numbers. Christ's birth is powerful because sin and death remain realities. Christ's birth brings violence from those who fear God's design and rule. The life of the church is the life of faithful and courageous opposition to all powers that are an affront to the salvation of God in Christ. In the midst of unfairness and violence, in what ways can Christians respond with truth and peace? How does the message of Christ's birth and return from Egypt give you courage to live each day as a child of God?

Pray: O, Holy Jesus, your path of love and salvation brings hope to a world that needs saving. Blessed be the name of the Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



A refugee is one who leaves their country because they encounter danger in their lives. Herod wanted to destroy Jesus. For this reason, Jesus' family fled to Egypt and became refugees. When refugees enter a new country, they are in need of compassion and care. There are many Christian organizations providing food, language lessons, and housing for refugees. Become familiar with refugee needs and take action through prayer and donations to support them.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



In Psalm 148 we read the word "praise" twelve times. All twelve times the praise is for God: for all of creation, for rulers of the earth, and for women and men of all ages. Make a list of things to praise God for: from friends and family, to trees and birds, and to everyone you meet. The list can be endless. Set aside a quiet time each day to reflect on your list and praise God by praying your list out loud.
